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FROM THE CLERGY

Dear Friends,

This month sees us celebrating several festivals: Ascension Day when Jesus returns to heaven. Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit descends on those gathered in Jerusalem, and Trinity Sunday, when we celebrate the mystery that is the Holy Trinity: God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. It's a busy month, but many of these festivals seem to pass people by. This month I want to write about Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit.

I'm hoping by the time you read this that we may be seeing a little more sunshine and feeling some warmth in it. It is remarkable the difference sunshine makes to us as people, let alone the rest of creation. When the sun shines people's heads tend to raise, you see more smiles on faces, and they seem less stressed and more enthusiastic about life. Why is that? There may be many reasons but one might be because light gives us energy. It is well known that our bodies need vitamin D especially our bones and muscles and that a lack of it can affect our health. The sun gives us that vitamin D and in turn gives us energy. You might say the sun 'fires us up'.

In the same way our spiritual lives need that spark, we need 'setting on fire for God,' metaphorically speaking that is. Jesus promised after ascending to heaven that he would not leave us alone, that he would send someone to be with us always. That someone was the Holy Spirt, the third person of the Trinity. God's Spirit was present at the time of creation, Genesis tells us 'The Spirit hovered over the water'. It is God's Spirit that equips us, that energises us for action.

On the Day of Pentecost when Jesus' followers were gathered in Jerusalem there came the sound of a mighty wind and tongues of fire rested on each of them and they were filled with the Holy Spirit. We are not told what that felt like, maybe it felt like an almighty burst of energy that had them awake, alert and ready to go. What we are told is that they began to speak in other tongues and all those who were gathered could hear them speak in their own language.

Peter the disciple who denied knowing Jesus not once, but three times, stood up to speak about repentance and the Good News of Christ. People heard and believed and 3,000 people were added to the Church that day.

It would be amazing if that was to happen in our churches and our communities, it has been known in the past and there is no reason why it shouldn't now. At our Baptism and Confirmation, we pray for the Holy Spirit to come and fill us and as Christians we should be praying for that all the time, because we constantly need the Holy Spirit to fill and equip us for God's work. Whatever we do in God's name we do not do in our own strength but in God's and it is the Holy Spirit that gives us strength and wisdom.

One gentleman a few years ago told me how he experienced the Holy Spirit at his confirmation service. He said he was 'tingling' all over and felt warm and when he looked at the Bishop there was a glow around her. Others have likened it to the 'Ready Brek' advert. They felt on fire and glowing. The Holy Spirit is powerful and is our power supply enabling us to do what God's calls us to do.

As churches, we are being called to grow our churches, for them to reflect the diversity of our communities. We need help to do that, the help of the Holy Spirit.

When we are set on 'fire' for God amazing things happen.

As we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit this Pentecost let us pray for us to be filled anew and to be set on fire for God. May we be enthused and energised to go out with confidence and help others come to know the God who created us and loves us.

Seeking Slowworms

There's often a secret to be found within a churchyard or cemetery, slowworms may be living there, rarely seen by visitors as they tend to hide within the vegetation and don't emerge to bask in the sun like other reptiles. Slowworms are not particularly

slow and they are not worms, neither are they snakes. They are actually lizards without legs and, when warmed up and active can be pretty nippy! Slowworms hunt in hidden places such as compost heaps, thick vegetation at the base of a wall or hedge and within piles of logs or stones. They catch slower moving prey like slugs and can 'drop' their tails to escape predators, a characteristic of all lizards.

May is a good time to look for them and the easiest way to do this is to put out some pieces of old roofing material, about 50cm square. You can use corrugated tin, but this can have sharp edges, onduline is better and a supplier may give you some offcuts for free. Following a conversation with those who manage the site, place a few of these squares in areas that catch the morning sun and are away from paths, perhaps in rougher vegetation such as tussocky grass. Slowworms will go under the squares to warm up in the mornings before going out to hunt and may be there at any time of day in colder weather.

Check the squares about once a week, lifting one side carefully and looking underneath. Try and check between 8:00 and 10:00am for best results as this is when the animals are warming up. You may be rewarded by a slowworm and also many other creatures such as worms, beetles or woodlice. Why not take a quick picture as the square is lifted, before too much scurries or slithers off! It may take

animals a while to find the squares so be patient, having more squares gives a better chance of seeing slowworms.



Churchyards and cemeteries are havens for reptiles and also amphibians such as frogs, toads and newts and we're collecting information to better understand just how important they are for these animals. Please take a photo using the iNaturalist app or let us know what you've seen via email if you don't use iNaturalist. You can keep checking for slowworms from April or May through to September. Why not include a peep under the square as part of a Churches Count on Nature event during Love Your Burial Ground week - 8th and 16th June.

PIONEERING PARISHES—CREATIVELY CONNECTING CHURCH AND COMMUNITY

Maybe you have a great idea for how your parish church could connect more with its local community, but you don't know how to make this vision a reality? Maybe you'd love to be more focused on mission, but your church seems to be using up all their energy on supporting day-to-day ministry? Or maybe you find the term 'pioneering' ra-

ther mysterious and question its relevance to parish life?

The Pioneering Parishes programme enables participants with questions just like these to discover how to become more outward looking, moving energy from inside the church to mission within our parish communities. Through involvement in a series of webinars and learning spaces, connection and conversation with parishioners, pioneers and priests will help explore how pioneering is integral to parish life. Clergy and congregation members will be inspired and

equipped to shift church culture to enable the cure of souls to be extended into all the parish.

Pioneering Parishes is a project run through the Church Mission Society (CMS) and led by a team that deeply understands and inhabits both pioneering and parish ministry. Lichfield Diocese is excited to be partnering with Pioneering Parishes from April 2024 to facilitate the delivery of on-line webinars and in-house training, supporting the development of fresh expressions and new worshipping communities across city, urban and rural settings.

The Pioneering Parishes team facilitates a series of 90-minute webinars for individuals from parishes or, even better, groups can sign up and explore ideas and learning together. One story describes how churches in Cosham, Portsmouth, set up a community larder; the Vicar, Revd Amy Webb saying of Pioneering Parishes "the training ... helped us to develop a 'let's give it a go' attitude and challenged us to set about changing the culture of our church, which over time had become very inward looking.

"This then meant that during the pandemic, when a secular charity asked us if we would be willing to set up and run a food pantry in a local park, we felt able to say yes. And we said 'yes' without us having any financial or human resources to speak of, or any firm plan as to how this would be possible.

"Step by step we worked it out. This was our opportunity to be the body of Christ out in our community, to share the love of God, build relationships and see what might develop from that'."



The birds all in the tree tops tweeting loud and trill watch black clouds roll over, raining lots more still.



MEETING OTHER FAITHS

Many years ago, when I taught Religious Education in a comprehensive school, we put a lot of emphasis on learning about the major world faiths, including Islam, Judaism, Hinduism and Buddhism. The students responded very well to an empathetic approach—trying to understand what it is like to follow a particular faith.

Now, in the present state of affairs, it seems even more important for there to be empathy and understanding between all people of faith. In my own experience, I have found meeting with people of different faiths overwhelmingly positive—from a chance conversation on a bench in Manchester Railway Station with a young Jewish student, studying at a strict orthodox Jewish college, to a meeting in Parliament of faith representatives around the subject of assisted dying: there is always something to learn, to cherish and to be challenged by.

In the following article, Anita Weeks tells us about **Vesak Day**, an important Buddhist Festival, and its relevance to all of us today.

THE BUDDHIST FESTIVAL, VESAK DAY

The 23rd May is Vesak Day, the most important of Buddhist festivals. Vesak Day commemorates the birth of the Buddha, his experience of finding enlightenment and his death.

On the surface there are similarities between Buddhism and Christianity. Fundamental teachings of Buddhism are peace, compassion and kindness to others, all of which were taught too by Jesus. Just as Christianity diverged into different denominations, so Buddhism has a variety of schools and sects. Orthodox Christians and Catholic Christians celebrate the same festivals on different days, and Buddhists of different traditions celebrate Vesak on different days. Buddha is an honorific title ("the awakened one") and Jesus of Nazareth was given the title, "Messiah".

There are, though, profound differences. Buddhism is not a religion, but a way of life people are urged to follow. The Buddha was a

man, not a god – he died at about 80, according to tradition, of dysentery or food poisoning.

Both Christians and Buddhists celebrate festivals by giving gifts. But Vesak is very different from the traditions which have grown up around Christmas of a period of preparation (Advent) followed by feasting, giving presents to family and friends and being generous to others. At Vesak Buddhists are enjoined to put aside their own needs, desires and appetites. Vesak is a day on which to make a special effort to bring happiness to others, particularly those less fortunate than oneself. Buddhists mark Vesak by giving gifts to strangers, making donations, volunteering, feeding others, and doing work for others.

Many of us listening to news bulletins will have heard Antonio Guterres, the United Nations Secretary-General, speaking about the Israel – Gaza war (for a recent report of what he has said go to: https://www.bbc.co.uk/news/world-middle-east-68646159). This is what Antonio Guterres said to mark last year's Vesak Day, and his words are even more relevant today:-

"At this time of strife, the Buddha's teachings of tolerance compassion and service to humanity are a source of solace and strength. As we navigate the path to a better future, let us seize the spirit of Vesak."



This book will encourage grandparents to be a unique voice, speaking into their grandchildren's lives, and helping to nurture them into the reality of a relationship with the God who loves them.

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
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
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
