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MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Dear friends,

It is Easter Sunday evening as I sit down to write this newsletter. Those of us who have journeyed together through this past week in church it has been a journey of pain, sadness, horror even, as we traced Jesus' footsteps from his triumphant entry into Jerusalem where he was hailed as King with shouts of 'Hosanna, hosanna' ringing through the streets of the city. However, these shouts of hosanna soon turned to jeers. Chief priests and pharisees began calling for his arrest - they feared an uprising as more people became amazed at the things Jesus proclaimed, backed up with healings and other miracles. Thursday through to Friday we followed Jesus from the upper room where he ate his last meal with his disciples, to Gethsemane where his disciples could-n't stay awake whilst Jesus prayed to his Father, asking that the cup of suffering which he knew was ahead of him might be avoided, knowing deep down that he must go through suffering and death in order to fulfil God's plan for the deliverance of humankind from their sin.

Friday, we followed Jesus on his journey to the cross, each picture depicting his suffering, humiliation and finally his execution. The last hour, we listened to his last words before he died. And there we left him, buried hurriedly in a tomb which was sealed with a stone at its entrance.

This morning some of us were up with the dawn to celebrate - to celebrate Jesus' rising from the grave. HE IS RISEN!! All the heaviness of the week lifting as we sang, *Jesus Christ is risen today* and *Thine be the Glory!*

You must be wondering why I am talking about Easter when we are now in May; most if not all our Easter eggs have been eaten and the Easter story is put away for another year. How sad for us if this is what we think. Is it because we don't 'do' pain and suffering – once a year is enough – and for some even once a year is too much, it is much easier to go from Palm Sunday to Easter Day missing out the difficult bits.

Here in the West, we have it so easy being a Christian. We come to church Sunday by Sunday without any fear of being persecuted by others. We sing our hymns with gusto, we advertise our services and we are encouraged to talk to our friends and neighbours about our faith. But what about the 'Persecuted Church', or the 'Secret Church'? Fear, suffering, marginalization and even death is a daily threat to so many of our brothers and sisters in countries where to be a Christian is a crime. I heard only this last week about a young Muslim girl who found Jesus. She was so overjoyed, her love for Jesus was so real. A few weeks ago she posted on social media herself singing and praising Jesus. Not long after her posting this, her brother went to her house and shot her dead!

What is it that keeps the persecuted church growing that even the threat of death doesn't deter them from following their Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ? Would you and I still hold onto our faith if we were in the position of so many who live in countries where governments and cultures are so anti-Christian, anti-Christ?

If you would like to find out more about the Persecuted Church, come along to the next Deanery Synod meeting, 23rd June at Welsh Frankton Church where we will be welcoming Rebecca who works for the international charity, Open Doors, a charity which works alongside partners in countries where being Christian is dangerous. In the meantime, let us continue to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ daily but also remember that He suffered and died for each one of us.

A Prayer for Ukraine

Brimstone, the original Butterfly

May is a lovely month to look for butterflies, several of our native species are on the wing at this time of year including the striking yellow brimstone. It is thought that the name but-

terfly comes from this large, yellow beauty, literally 'butter fly'! When you see one flying it is highly visible but actually it can be well camouflaged too; have a look at the shape of the brimstone's wing and you will see that it closely resembles a leaf. When at rest they can disappear amongst foliage.

Brimstones can be seen early in the year as they overwinter as adults, emerging from hibernation to lay eggs in April or May, ready to hatch as green caterpillars in July. Following pupation in August, adults are back in early autumn, feeding and finding sites to overwin-

ter. The other spring butterflies that you see will have either overwintered as adults, such as the red admiral or small tortoiseshells, or as a chrysalis or pupa – orange tips do this as do holly blues. Some butterflies overwinter as caterpillars, the meadow brown for example.



Brimstone caterpillars feed on buckthorn and alder buckthorn so if you are planting a hedge try and include these, buckthorn favours calcareous soil and alder buckthorn more acidic conditions. Churchyards are great for butterflies as they contain such a rich array of plants. If you have an area which is managed as a meadow you may have many species of caterpillar chomping away at the plants within it. Look out for orange tips laying eggs on cuckoo flower, garlic and hedge mustard, or the speckled wood, also flying in May, which lays eggs on native grasses such as Yorkshire fog and couch grass. This butterfly prefers long grass so may use a tussocky area at the back of your churchyard, perhaps near to shade trees.

We'd love to know what butterflies you see as well as any other wildlife that you spot. Why not while away a sunny hour or two looking for butterflies in this beautiful place.

Welcome Home

Dementia Action Week

Dementia Action Week runs from 16-22 May this year. It is focusing on diagnosis, encouraging people who might be living with undiagnosed dementia to seek guidance and support. Someone living with dementia has said to me, "Diagnosis is like a bereavement". He went on to explain, however, "It's not an end. There's a life to live." Both statements are true – and they don't cancel each other out. These comments about a diagnosis of dementia hold together both the loss and the life, the lamenting and the celebrating.

As we name and face dementia and memory loss in our churches, we can open up important conversations and connections. A good starting point could be our Diocese of Lichfield Dementia Action Week Prayer.

In moments of confusion, God keep us safe. In moments of clarity, God grant us joy. In moments of frustration, God give us peace. In moments of sorrow, God bring us comfort.

May God who sees into the secret places of our mind, beyond anything which limits us,

to the person that is us, has always been and will always be us, encircle us in his arms, until that day when all is made new in his eternal home. Amen



This prayer holds together both the reality of current challenges and the persistent hope that leads us forwards. So it goes to the heart of our faith, recognising that the cross and resurrection of Jesus shows us a path through death to life: the toughest place is real, but it does not have the last word.

It may be a helpful prayer to include at the funeral of someone who has lived with dementia. In preparing for a funeral, a family may be keen to focus on the whole lifespan, not just the final chapter with dementia – and this might suggest that dementia shouldn't be mentioned. Nevertheless, it is strong to acknowledge the reality of the path, without giving dementia the final word. So this may be a helpful prayer to pray, perhaps introduced like this: "Remembering the last chapter of [the person]'s life and all who are affected by dementia, we pray...".

It's also a prayer we can use in Dementia Action Week across our churches, as we pray for people affected by dementia. And it's a prayer we can pray at home, day by day, alongside all who are affected by dementia. We recognise the challenge and the loss – and we still have the courage to trust in the life and love that is deeper.

HOLY TRINITY WESTON LULLINGFIELDS

Jane Ing has been taking some of us (Church and WI) for some very interesting walks around Weston Lullingfields and Stanwardine. Some were on public footpaths to do repairs and tidying up stiles. In early April Jane met us at the War Memorial and walked us down to the wharf pointing out the older houses and giving a history of the people who had lived in them. What is now a property was once a public house. A GP used to hold surgeries there twice a week for the village. We followed the line of a ditch along the lane. It runs across the fields and meets the canal. It was necessary to dig a culvert right under the canal to enable it to cross the fields on the far side. It was most interesting to hear and see some of the history of the canal. Where the canal passed under a hump back bridge, stonework has been exposed showing some of the bank-side mechanism which was in place there. Behind houses are the remains of lime kilns. Canal boats transported not only farm produce but also lime for building and for fertiliser. We also met some of Jane's Southdown sheep and their new lambs as well as looking at the spring flowers on the way. On one of the old canal banks there was a huge patch of primroses in flower. A very enjoyable morning finished with morning coffee and cakes at Jane's house.

Saint of the Month Mother Julian of Norwich (8th May in the Anglican Calendar)

In May 1373, a woman took to her bed, believing that she was shortly going to die. She was 30 years old. During her illness she experienced a series of 16 extraordinary visions.

Julian of Norwich wrote the first work in the English language— Revelations of Divine Love - which we can be sure was authored by a woman. For this fact alone she is remarkable, but she was also one of the most sophisticated and unusual theologians of her era.

From Revelations of Divine Love

"And in this, he showed a little thing the quantity of a hazelnut, lying in the palm of my hand as it seemed to me, and it was as round as any ball. I looked therein with the eye of my understanding, and thought: "What may this be?" And it was answered generally thus: "It is all that is made." I marveled how it might last, for it seemed to me it might suddenly have fallen into nought for its littleness. And I was answered in my understanding: "It lasteth and ever shall, because God loveth it. And so hath all things being by the love of God." *Short Text ch iv*

"It is true that sin is cause of all this suffering, but all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well. These words were said very tenderly, indicating no kind of blame." *Long Text ch xxvii*

Thy Kingdom Come—26th May to 6th June

At the beginning of Acts of the Apostles, between the Ascension of Jesus and the Day of Pentecost—11 days—the followers of Jesus spent time praying for the Holy Spirit.

Thy Kingdom Come is a global prayer movement that invites Christians around the world, like the first Christians, to pray between Ascension and Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus.

In 2016 the Archbishops of Canterbury and York invited the parishes and dioceses of the Church of England to join together in this wave of prayer. The response to that invitation was quite overwhelming—not only that so many parishes and individuals took part, but that Christians of many other denominations wanted to join in. They were asking, 'Why weren't we invited as well?'

The following year churches of other denominations in the UK were involved in the planning and preparation, and others across the world began also to get involved. The movement soon also included churches of all the main Christian traditions. Now, in its seventh year, **Thy Kingdom** Come has indeed become an international and ecumenical call to prayer., with Christians from 172 nations and 80 denominations taking part.

The basis of it is very simple:

- We are invited to pray in our own way—it is not prescriptive, and rejoices in the diversity of prayer across the many Christian traditions.
- We are invited to pray for five other people—whatever their needs are, asking that they and we will come to faith and deepen our relationship with Jesus Christ.
- We are invited to pray that the Holy Spirit will empower us and our Christian communities to be more effective in our witness to the Gospel.



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
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
